

ppreciation for the craftsmanship of guns made in Fulton in the first half of the 20th century has triggered a special annual event that was celebrated again this year at the 9th Hunter Arms Homecoming, which was held on August 23-24. Fair skies and comfortable temperatures prevailed both days, providing favorable shooting conditions at the Pathfinder Fish and Game Club. L. C. Smith Collectors Association (L.C.S.C.A.) members were joined by a few local shooters to use L. C. Smith/Fulton guns at the event. All were welcomed to the club to enjoy the sport of breaking clay targets. Contestants proudly shouldered their "Sweet Elsie" side by side or single barrel guns to "bust" the clay birds at the club's various ranges.

As members gathered to greet one another, friend-ships were renewed and new ones were formed. This became apparent as conversations and bursts of laughter could be heard whenever a group of two or more gathered. Often words of encouragement were given to fellow shooters or sometimes a friendly ribbing was shared within the shooting contingent. Most importantly, good sportsmanship was abundantly shown regardless of the number of birds that got broken by their beloved L. C. Smiths.

Four competitions consisting of trap, skeet, 5-stand, and sporting clays were offered to test shooting skills.

Shooters had their choice of shooting in one, two, three, or all four of competitions. Each consisted of a round of 50 birds. Some participants shot for fun while others participated in a friendly competition. The top 3 places in each competition and High Gun received an award. (Results of the friendly competition are on page 4.)

The Pratt House Museum was open to the public to admire the displays that showcase the quality workmanship of LC Smith/Fulton guns. It also provided an opportunity for everyone to learn about the history of the Hunter family, the factory, and its employees. The Hunter Gallery at the Pratt House, located on the second floor, is full of related Hunter memorabilia. It includes L. C. Smith guns, a Hunter bicycle, Hunter fans, and much more. Other displays of Fulton history are featured in different rooms and were open for visitation throughout the weekend.

The weekend concluded with an Awards Banquet at the Tavern on the Lock Restaurant, which is only a few hundred feet south of where the Hunter Factory once stood. Special guests this year were Jim and Terry Hunter and Barbra Wadsworth, descendants of the Hunter Brothers.

After a cocktail hour and buffet dinner, Frank Finch gave an update on L.C.S.C.A. happenings. The Fulton Mayor's representative gave a short speech and read the proclamation proclaiming the Hunter Arms Homecom-

L.C. Smith Collectors Association

The Friends of History in Fulton are proud to have the L.C. Smith Collectors Association (L.C.S.C.A.) as our sponsor. This year was the ninth annual Hunter Arms Homecoming hosted by the Friends of History at the John Wells Pratt House Museum. For the past nine years, we have been fortunate and honored to hold the Homecoming where collectors, shooters, and anyone interested in history gather and share information about L.C. Smith and Hunter Arms guns in the city where they were produced from the 1890s to 1950.

The L.C. Smith shotgun is an American classic and is unquestionably one of the finest shotguns ever made. L.C.S.C.A. was formed to stimulate and educate members and the public in their knowledge of the history and production of the L.C. Smith shotgun; encourage the value of good sportsmanship to shooter and collector members and the public; promote a positive, responsible use of firearms to members and the public; and encourage creation of an L.C. Smith museum.

It all began when a few gun collectors stumbled into each other at gun shows and found that their L.C. Smith guns were of common interest. On one such occasion at a gun show in March of 2002, several of the gun collectors huddled and began talking about forming an association where they then promised to meet again. Over the following months they discussed the next steps in forming the organization. The seven member group is referred to unofficially, but affectionately, as the founding members: Len Applegate, Andy Anderson, Boby Trefry, Bill Winter, Rich Beyer, Frank Finch, and Mary Anne Finch.

L.C.S.C.A. began with fifteen charter members, and in a very short time, membership increased to over fifty members. Today, the membership now has around 700 members; sponsors or sanctions events around the United States from California to New York; publishes a 28page color journal full of history, technical articles, and current and future events; hosts an internet website with a popular information dispensing forum; and much more.
