Remembering Marian

few months ago, Fulton lost one of her finest citizens: Marian Stanton. Marian was no stranger

to many of us. She was born in Fulton and attended Fulton schools before attending Syracuse University and graduating from Katherine Gibbs School. After venturing into big cities such as New York City and Chicago, Marian returned to her native city, where she quickly became one of Ful-

ton's most admired citizens. Many remember her as the store owner and operator of Murphy's Gifts.

An avid reader, Marian served as a member and president of the Fulton Public Library Board, successfully fighting to fund the historic Carnegie Library as a school district public library and to obtain grants to facilitate library improvements. Marian also served on the boards of the Oswego College Foundation and The Manor at Seneca Hill, was a longtime member of the local Salvation Army board and was active in the Greater Fulton Chamber of Commerce.

But Marian's interests extended far beyond Fulton. She was a proud leader of the Syracuse James Joyce Club. She was also a member of the Irish American Cultural Institute's Syracuse chapter and an active member of the Corinthian Club, often bringing her Fulton friends to events at the Club. Marian was a member of the faith community and Eucharistic minister at St. Lucy's Church on the near west side of Syracuse and was a regular volunteer at the Syracuse Samaritan Center.

▼he 10th Annual Hunter Arms Homecoming that was to take place on August 21 – 22 has been postponed due to the outbreak of the coronavirus.

Many things were considered in the decision process, including mass gathering limits, restaurant regulations, and the New York State imposed mandates issued for travel; many L.C. 


